"Patient safety is our top priority," said Dr. David Christensen, senior vice president, medical affairs and chief medical officer. "One error is one too many, and we will not stop until we reach our goal of zero preventable harm."

Much of the progress comes from our dedication to becoming a high-reliability organization, or HRO. Similar to the aviation and nuclear industries that operate under extremely high-risk situations but have less than their expected number of adverse events, in an HRO everyone from the frontlines to the boardroom feels responsible for safety and behaves accordingly. This culture of safety compels peers to hold one another accountable, and encourages everyone to report errors.

To support our safety culture, we implemented:

- An organization-wide daily safety huddle
- A unit-based safety coach program
- Executive patient safety rounds
- Error prevention training
- Safety behavior expectations:
 - Everyone makes a personal commitment to safety
 - Everyone is accountable for clear and complete communication
 - Everyone supports a questioning attitude

This year, Valley Children's once again achieved outstanding results nationally for neonates born less than 1,500 grams (3 lbs 5 oz) in terms of survival and leaving the hospital without certain prematurity-related complications. Our 88-bed, Regional Level IV Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) provides the highest level, 24-hour care possible for fragile babies in Central California. Nearly 100% of our NICU staff completed new safety culture training, with all staff training housewide expected by year-end 2017.

And according to the industry watchdog's 2016 report, we also fully met The Leapfrog Group's standards on several measures relating to inpatient care management, infections and injuries, and medication safety.

"Valley Children's is committed to doing the right thing at the right time in the right way for every patient," said Dr. Karen Dahl, vice president, quality and patient safety. "Our kids deserve the best care possible."



DEFYING ALL ODDS

Extreme Preemie's Care Team and Family 'Never Gave Up'

Born at just 23 weeks on Thanksgiving Day, Jesus Davila barely weighed a pound – tiny enough to fit in the palm of a hand.

He also suffered esophageal atresia (EA), a common gastroenterology birth defect in which the upper part of the esophagus does not connect with the lower esophagus and stomach, as well as tracheoesophageal fistula (TEF), an abnormal connection between the upper part of the esophagus and the trachea.

Babies like Jesus face an especially challenging future. Erika and Jesus Davila of Visalia were told their little boy had only a 5 percent chance of survival. Kaweah Delta Medical Center transferred Jesus to Valley Children's Hospital where they knew pediatric specialists who are specially trained in treating neonates with complex needs would take the best care of him.

LIFESAVING NEONATAL SURGERY

"Even though Jesus' condition was complicated, the doctors at Valley Children's said they would do everything possible to save my baby," Erika said. "We named him 'Jesus' because we felt he needed all the help he could get."

Due to his extreme prematurity, Jesus underwent the lifesaving, advanced surgery he needed in stages. While spending his first five months in Valley Children's nationally ranked Regional Level IV Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), he had three major chest operations: closure of the patent ductus arteriosus (a frequent congenital cardiac condition in low-birthweight premature neonates), and TEF and EA repairs. A gastrostomy tube was also inserted in his abdomen to deliver nutrition directly to the stomach.

"I've done many repairs of esophageal atresia, but none on a baby this small," said Dr. Michael Allshouse, medical director, pediatric surgery and trauma. "This is one of the surgeries that defines our specialty and what we can do."

CONTINUED PROGRESS

Today, Jesus is an active, good-natured 2 year old without any major developmental issues. He continues to see our pediatric specialists in gastroenterology, otolaryngology, pulmonology and more to monitor his progress.

"Everyone at Valley Children's was supportive and gave us encouragement," Erika said. "My baby is alive today because of them."

"Jesus defied all odds," said Dr. Jeffrey Pietz, chief of newborn medicine. "He and his parents never gave up and neither did we."

PROVIDING TELEMEDICINE AT OUR SPECIALTY CARE **CENTERS, REGIONAL NICUS AND PARTNER SITES ALSO INCREASES ACCESS TO HIGH-QUALITY CARE FOR** MANY PATIENT POPULATIONS, ESPECIALLY THOSE IN RURAL AREAS.

It becomes a means for providers and their patients to get support from pediatric subspecialists by using the latest telecommunication technologies. It prevents children and their families from having to travel long distances or be transferred unnecessarily for their care. TELEMEDICINE HELPS **SAVE NEWBORN**

Carmina Barba couldn't wait to give birth to her baby at home with the help of a midwife. After all, she went through 24 hours of false labor before true labor started and the baby was already 10 days overdue. It was time.

No one expected what happened next. Tulan Barba was born with the umbilical cord around his neck. When they realized he wasn't breathing, the midwife performed CPR right away. They called for the ambulance to rush the baby to Tehachapi Valley Healthcare District, now part of Adventist Health.

Carmina arrived at the Emergency Room (ED) a few minutes later and found her baby surrounded by a team of doctors, nurses, respiratory therapists, large-screen monitors and other medical equipment.

As a clinical partner of Valley Children's Healthcare, Adventist Health Tehachapi Valley immediately contacted Valley Children's and connected via telemedicine with our pediatric intensivist, Dr. Samuel Lehman, and neonatologist, Dr. Indira Chandrasekar.

IMMEDIATE RESPONSE TO CARE

By using the latest telecommunication technologies, telemedicine allows partners to get fast access and support from our pediatric specialists. The specialists provided clinical advice and recommendations to the Adventist staff for more than an hour. They were able to review and monitor Tulan's clinical status as well as observe treatment given by the Adventist ED team through live, interactive video. As a result, Tulan's respiratory distress was stabilized before he was transported by helicopter to Valley Children's Regional Level IV Neonatal Intensive Care Unit in Madera.

"I was impressed at how quickly everyone worked together," Carmina said. "Telemedicine was awesome. It gave the Adventist emergency room staff the confidence they needed to know they were doing what was necessary for Tulan."

"I'm convinced telemedicine contributed to the fact that Tulan is fine today," said Juliana Kirby, chief nursing officer at Adventist Health. "Our nurses and physicians felt comfortable having the Valley Children's specialists through live video in the room with them. It made a believer out of all our staff."

A 'MIRACLE' HOMECOMING

AFTER THREE WEEKS AT THE VALLEY CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL NICU, CARMINA WAS RELIEVED THAT HER BABY WAS GOING TO BE OK. SHE CALLS TULAN HER "CHRISTMAS MIRACLE," AS SHE BROUGHT HIM HOME THAT CHRISTMAS DAY.



"Everybody was amazing – from our midwife, to the paramedics, to the Adventist Health and Valley Children's staff," Carmina continued. "They were all Tulan's life savers."

Now 14 months old with no residual complications, Tulan is living up to his Mayan name meaning "bountiful." His middle name is Rhythm, which fits his personality perfectly.

"He is quite the rhythm-maker. He loves music and dancing," Carmina said. "He's above and beyond anything I could've expected."

Sharing Expertise

For decades, the world of healthcare trained in silos – physicians only trained with physicians, nurses with nurses, and so on and so on.

But at Valley Children's, our care is a collaborative effort at every turn. To support our high-quality, comprehensive care, we offer in-depth education and training programs for all our health professionals, regardless of experience or expertise.

For example, in the spring Valley Children's inaugural Interprofessional Education Development Day focused on everyone learning from each other, with all clinicians seeing themselves as teachers.

"Really, the new way of thinking about this is we work in teams, so we really should be training in teams," said Dr. Jolie Limon, chief of pediatrics and executive director, medical education.

Our nationally accredited Valley Children's Pediatric Residency Program, Affiliated with Stanford University School of Medicine is another example of this. The program started interviews for its inaugural class in the fall, with residents arriving in summer 2017. The program took an interprofessional approach to interviewing more than 130 candidates as it prepares to attract, train and retain the next generation of pediatricians.

People from across our workforce – from physicians to human resources - met with the interviewees to give them a sense of what it means to be part of Valley Children's culture.

As part of our dedication to collaborative training, clinical sites such as Lucile Packard Children's Hospital Stanford, Kaiser Permanente's Fresno Birthing Center and community private practices will help train our resident classes.

Valley Children's Interprofessional Simulation Program also supports all our clinical teams by mimicking real-life patient situations.

LEVEL II PEDIATRIC TRAUMA **CENTER DESIGNATION**

Valley Children's Hospital was designated Central California's only Level II Pediatric Trauma Center, allowing critically injured children to now be transported directly to us after traumatic events.

"Trauma is the leading cause of death in children, causing more fatalities than all other diseases combined," Valley Children's President and CEO Todd Suntrapak said. "When there is a traumatic event, children are better off going directly to a place where everyone - from our doctors and nurses to respiratory therapists and radiologists - is trained in the care of kids."



BEACON AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE

Our Pediatric Intensive Care Unit earned its third Beacon Award, a distinction meant to challenge acute and critical care nurses to improve care to the most critically ill patients.

BUILDING A PATIENT'S DOLL-AND CONFIDENCE

Little girls love their dolls.

And when the doll is relatable or looks like they do, it can have a positive effect on their confidence and self-esteem.

During a painting session with 8-year-old Melody Baker, Child Life Specialist Aimee Shipp was reminded of this. While the two sat and dabbled in their paints, Melody told Aimee how she always wanted a doll that resembled her.

Unfortunately, Melody's medical issues forced her to have a tracheostomy and gastrostomy tube. Dolls with those features are not on the shelves of toy aisles, and her mother, Christina Castillo, had searched online. But custom dolls like that can cost upward of \$500.

SO AIMEE GOT TO PLANNING. SHE WORKED WITH UTILITY ENGINEER CASEY CARTER AND NURSES FROM THE APOLLO INPATIENT UNIT. THEY TOOK A NEWLY DONATED DOLL AND, WITH SOME INGENUITY, FIT IT WITH A TRACHEOSTOMY AND G-TUBE.

When it was done, several staff members gathered to watch as the doll was given to Melody. She was thrilled to finally have one that looked like her. Her father was overcome with emotion upon seeing the happiness and excitement in his daughter's eyes.

"We were mesmerized by what they did," Christina said. "It was just, 'wow.' My daughter would always look at me when she got a doll and ask where the trach was and where the tube was. She loves this doll. She sleeps with it, too."

Weeks later, Aimee learned photos of the doll had been posted on Facebook. Christina said Melody was finding it easier to open up to people about her condition, using the doll as a visual aid, and that the doll made her feel "normal."

The innovation, collaboration and compassion that went into this project exemplify Our Best and why Valley Children's is a trusted champion for all children.

"Sharlyn is 5 now and doing well," Darsy said joyfully.





So when Darsy found out later her son, Rivaldo, would be born with the same complex condition, she had one thing to tell her OB: "Send me to Valley Children's."




